**March on the Hill**. I know the cancellation of the March on the Hill will disappoint many of you who look forward to participating in this annual event. This cancellation means that we will have to intensify individual efforts and we encourage all Patriots to meet with their respective members of Congress while doing your district work. Write letters, send faxes and make telephone calls on issues that concern veterans. One effective way is for the entire membership of a Chapter to sign letters to your senator or congressman on issues of concern.

**Cell Phones for Soldiers**. Patriot Scotty McKenzie, Cell Phones for Soldiers Coordinator, continues to be a powerful advocate for that program. A recent letter from a warrior's wife points up its value: "I just wanted to take a minute and "thank you" for this wonderful program. My husband is in Afghanistan and the calling cards have been a blessing. . . It is wonderful to hear my husband's voice each time he calls . . ." Another note from the West Virginia VA Medical Center comments: "Because our Centers include veterans from neighboring states, the cell phone cards enable many patients to contact their loved ones residing considerable distances from the VA facility." In addition, in Martinsburg WV, a number of members of the 167th Aero Medical Squadron of the West Virginia National Guard deploy to South Asia for extended duty assignments in support of the US Air Force. "Your cell phones have proven a God send for many of these troops."

#### VA BURIAL BENEFITS - MAY NOT BE ENOUGH

From time to time, we hear Patriots talk about the burial benefits they expect from the VA so we thought we'd look into some aspects. Here's the VA's language on the subject:

"Burial in a VA National Cemetery is available for eligible veterans, their spouses and dependents at no cost to the family and includes the gravesite, grave-liner, opening and closing of the grave, a headstone or marker, and perpetual care as part of a national shrine. For veterans, benefits also include a burial flag (with case for active duty) and military funeral honors. Family members and other loved ones of the deceased veteran may request a Presidential Memorial Certificate.

Upon request, DoD will provide military funeral honors consisting of the folding and presentation of the United States flag and the playing of *Taps*. A funeral honors detail consists of two or more uniformed members of the armed forces, with at least one member from the deceased branch of service."

Note there's no mention of perhaps the major expense of death – the cost of the coffin and mortuary services, although VA will pay a \$300 "burial and funeral allowance" under certain circumstances. How far will that go to meeting your expenses? Well, the National Funeral Director's Association estimates over \$4,500 for basic services (processing the deceased and cost of casket) and over \$4,800 if you include a service at the funeral home. Many veterans believe caskets are free, but caskets are provided by the government only for active duty deaths.

This means that veterans and their families have to plan for expenses far beyond the government provided services and stipend. (Source: www.va.gov)

#### Guide for Arlington National Cemetery

The following information may be useful for both Patriots and their families in planning for interment in or visiting the Arlington National Cemetery.

#### Eligibility for Interment (ground burial) or inurnment in the Columbarium (ashes)

There are various conditions and awards that permit a veteran to be buried in the Cemetery, but the one that applies to all MOPH members is this one: Any member of the armed forces who has been awarded a Purple Heart Medal, and his or her spouse, widow or widower, minor child, or permanently dependent child, and certain unmarried adult children.

#### **Fees**

There are no fees or costs for any interment or inurnment. However, all costs associated with preparation of remains, casket or urn and shipping of remains to the DC area are at the expense of the estate, unless the deceased was on active duty. When planning funerals, recommend you check with your local VA and Social Security Office to determine any off-setting benefits.

#### FRANCE HONORS PATRIOT ELVERT POOLER WITH HIGHEST AWARD



On July 21, 2010, the Consul General of France of Boston MA, Christaphe Guilhou, presented the Legion of Honor Medal to Patriot Elvert 'Buck' Pooler, now 85, at the Sanford-Springvale Historical Museum in Sanford, ME. The Medal is France's highest civil and military award, created by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1802, to acknowledge great services

rendered to France. It was given to Pooler as a sign of gratitude for his bravery and heroism during France's liberation from Nazi Germany 65 years ago. Patriot Pooler is now a "Chevalier de la

Legion d'Honneur" or Knight in the National Order of the Legion of Honor.

Patriot Pooler served with Army units, including the 79th Infantry Di-

vision, that drove the German Army out of France, getting wounded twice – in July and December 1944. He was in the Army from July 1943 until January 1946 serving in

Europe from May 1944 to December 1945, earning a Bronze Star and, of course, the Purple Heart with one Oak Leaf Cluster. He's also very proud of his Combat Infantry Badge: "This means you've been in combat, I hold that above the others."

After the war, Pooler returned to Maine and helped out in his father's grocery store for a short while, spent time as a restaurant baker, had eleven years with the once famous Cushman Bakery as a door-to-door salesman, and then 25

years with the Modern Woodman of America Life Insurance Company, his last career.





If you helped in the liberation of France during WWII, you also may be eligible to receive the Legion of Honor Medal. Members who participated in one of the four major campaigns in the liberation of France (Normandy, Southern France, Northern France, and the Ardennes) can apply for the award. Documentation such as your DD-214 or any other document showing combat in France will be required. Send your request for consideration with copies of documentation to: Defense Attaché, Embassy of France, 4101 Reservoir Road NW, Washington DC 20007.

#### WAR BIRDS



The North American F-51 (P-51) Mustang, built in just 117 days, served in Europe with limited service in the Pacific. With its large internal and smaller external wing tanks, Mustangs could escort B-17s all the way to Germany and back, providing vital protection against German fighters.

At the start of the Korean War, F-51s became United Nation's main fighter, but this role was quickly assumed by jet aircraft and the Mustang became a close ground support aircraft. 51s were adopted by over 55 foreign air forces and continued to be an effective fighter or ground support aircraft into the mid-1980s. During wartime, the cost of a Mustang was 51,000 dollars. Mustangs were the fighter aircraft flown by the famous African-American Tuskegee Airmen, subject of recent books and films. A total of 16,766 Mustangs were built, the most of any American fighter aircraft.
