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DATABASE FOR MILITARY HONORS

Probably in reaction to the recent decision of the Supreme Court on stolen valor, the Pentagon plans to establish a database of military awards and medals, hoping for a techno-



logical fix to the problem of people lieing about earning military honors. Details have yet to be worked out, but the intent is to have a digitized repository of records for award and medals going back as far as possible. Such a database would make it easier to check on award claims and perhaps deter some who would make false public claims. [Washington]

PATRIOTS WERE MEMBERS OF WWII "BAND OF BROTHERS"

Patriot Edward "Eddie" Joseph Joint, member of MOPH Chapter 0147 in Pennsylvania,



died on 12 May 2012 and *Patriot Joseph A. Lesniewski*, member of MOPH Chapter 0197, also in Pennsylvania died on May 23, 2012. Both were members of Easy Company, 2nd Battalion, 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division, known as the **Band of Brothers** that invaded Normandy and fought in the Battle of the Bulge. The unit's history was made into a ten part HBO WWII miniseries that ran in 2001, based on a book with the same name by Stephen Ambrose.

POSSIBLE RETURN TO FORMER SOUTHEAST ASIA BASES

In response to China's growing military power and its recent claims to disputed areas, our military planners reportedly are considering a return to former bases in Thailand, Vietnam



and the Philippines. In Thailand, they're looking at U-Tapao, with its US built airfield with two mile runways which housed B-52 bombers during the Vietnam War and showing interest in more visits to Thai ports. In Vietnam, the large naval and air base at Cam Ranh Bay is of high interest - its deep water port and adjoining airfield make it an ideal location to support Seventh Fleet operations. And in the Philippines, both the Subic Bay Port/Cubi Point Airfield complex and Clark Air Base were key repair and supply hubs during the Vietnam war and could be the same for future US operations. Bases in all three coun-

tries could support deploying the new P-8A Poseidon reconnaissance and ASW aircraft in place of the current P-3C Orions, basing the new Littoral Combat Ships and flying high altitude surveillance drones. Subic Bay is also a natural deep water port like Cam Ranh and still has extensive repair facilities. At present, we have agreements with Australia, Singapore and Japan for military support; whether other Asian countries provide similar support will depend upon their reactions to China's flexing of its developing military muscles.

ACTOR ERNEST BORGNINE DIES - NAVY VETERAN

"I wouldn't trade those 10 years for anything. The Navy taught me a lot of things. It molded me as a man, and I made a lot of wonderful friends."

Ernest Borgnine, Oscar winning actor who died at age 95 on July 8, 2012. Borgnine joined the Navy in 1935, was discharged in 1941, re-enlisted when the United States entered World War II, and served until 1945 (a total of ten years), reaching the rate of Gunner's Mate 1st Class. He served aboard the destroyer *USS Lamberton* (DD-119). Borgnine received the honorary rating of Chief Petty Officer in October 2004.

NATIONAL CONVENTION NOTES:

<u>AIRPORT TRANSPORTATION:</u> After your luggage has been retrieved, find the courtesy phone located at the NORTH door of the baggage claim area. **Dial 40 which is the number labeled "The Scottsdale Plaza Resort."** Guests will be asked your name and your flight information – you will then be directed to an exit door number; cross the street to the Resort Shuttles Vehicle Loading area – The Shuttle is marked "The Scottsdale Plaza Resort." The \$17.00 charge per person each way – includes the driver gratuity – this is posted directly to your room account. Shuttle departs every half-hour on the hour and the half hour between 5:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. seven days a week.

ALL WHO REQUIRE HANDICAPPED/LIFT SHUTTLE SERVICE FROM THE AIRPORT TO THE HOTEL Special Shuttle Service will need to be arranged through: Quality Transport Services

PROCESS: Due to Airport congestion and TSA security requirements, they require 24 hour advance notice of flight time arrivals. They do not have a toll-free number, but passengers can use email (INFO@QTSaz.com) or actually book your travel reservation on their website (www.QTSaz.com) and they will immediately call back or email back with a confirmation. Payment by CC is fine for any of the travelers. They'll take the card at the time of reservation and charge it when trip is completed.

*** QTS located 5 minutes from the Airport - so arriving passenger simply call their 24 hour number 602.371.1000 when in the terminal and ready for pick-up. Since they aren't allowed to wait by the terminal, calling from the airport is simply to confirm safe arrival, retrieval of bags and ready to head on over. **Depending on arrival times** - QTS will transport one or two persons at a time. If you are traveling with a companion or service animal, please let them know if advance. There is no additional charge for a companion.

***Rates for Pick-Up, including luggage, and gratuity - \$68.00

Recommended that you make your reservation well in advance - and they'll let them know about calling for pick-up with your confirmation. They hope to minimize any confusion.

For any Special Events QTS also has special rates for veterans for personal transportation if you would like to get out during the week for any of the special events - just call their number any time for a reservation. ***BE SURE TO SCHEDULE YOUR RETURN TRIP

MOPH IN NATIONAL INDEPENDENCE DAY PARADE

Once again, MOPH was the only Congressionally Chartered veterans organization in the 4th of July Independence Day Parade along Constitution Avenue in Washington DC. Chapter 2222 first appeared in the 1995 parade and there's been a Purple Heart unit in the parade every year since. Thousands of spectators from all over the nation and the world line the parade route to watch the participating units stream by.

ORGANIZATIONS SUPPORTING VETERANS - ONE OF A SERIES **USO'S NEW INITIATIVE - HEALING WITH HONOR**

USO (United Service Organizations) is developing a new initiative called **Healing With Honor** - "perhaps the most important we've ever undertaken." The program will build from existing services that include physical health and recreation, behavioral health and wellness, education, employment, family support and reintegration into civilian life. Ground already has been broken for its first Warrior and Family Care Center at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. A second Center will be built at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda, Maryland.



At the same time, USO will continue to provide "caring and compassionate support to wounded warriors and their families at every opportunity and at every USO facility around the world." It just opened a new Warrior Recovery Center in Kandahar, Afghanistan, and will be opening more at many of its other Centers in Afghanistan.

Until Every One Comes Home. The private non-profit USO was founded in 1941 in response to a request from President Franklin D. Roosevelt to provide morale and recreation services to U.S. uniformed military personnel. Roosevelt was elected as its honorary chairman. This request brought together six civilian organizations: the Salvation Army, Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA), Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA), National Catholic Community Service, National Travelers Aid Association and the National Jewish Welfare Board. They were brought together under one umbrella to support U.S. troops. Roosevelt said he wanted "these private organizations to handle the on-leave recreation of the men in the armed forces." According to historian Emily Yellin, "The government was to build the buildings and the USO was to raise private funds to carry out its main mission: boosting the morale of the military."

Since 1941, USO has worked in partnership with the Department of Defense (DOD), relying heavily on private contributions and on funds, goods, and services from various corporate and individual donors. Although congressionally chartered, it is not a government agency. The USO operates 160 centers worldwide in 14 countries and 27 states. In 2011, USO Centers served eight million visitors. The USO has a paid staff of approximately 300. Additionally, more than 44,000 USO volunteers provide an estimated 371,417 hours of service annually. As reported by the USO, the unpaid volunteer to paid employee ratio overseas is 20 to 1. Within the United States, the number is "significantly higher". [Source: various]

About 900 Russian tanks attacked an equal number of German tanks, fighting at close range. When Hitler ordered a cease-fire, 300 German tanks remained strewn over the battlefield.

WAR BIRDS



The Grumman F6F Hellcat was a WWII carrier-based fighter aircraft specifically designed to counter the Japanese Zero. Standard armament was six .50 in machine guns and six HVARs under the wings. In the critical years of 1943 and 1944, the Hellcat ruled the skies of the Western Pacific. During the Battle of the Philippine Sea, it shot down so many enemy aircraft that aircrews nicknamed the battle *The Great Marianas* Turkey Shoot. The **Hellcat** was credited with destroying 5,271 aircraft while in service with the US Navy and Marine Corps. Postwar, it was phased out of front line service, but remained active as late as 1954 as a night fighter. The French Air Force used F6F's in Indochina and the Uruguayan Navy used them until the early 1960's. Top **Hellcat** ace was Medal of Honor recipient Navy CDR David McCampbell with 34 kills. He was awarded his MOH for leading his outnumbered fighter planes against a force of 80 Japanese carrier based aircraft bearing down on the US Fleet during the Battle of the Philippine Sea in 1944. He personally destroyed seven hostile planes.
